#### Lovejoy Helps Reveal Findings That Revise Human Evolution Timeline



Throw out all those posters and books that depict an ape evolving into a human being, says Dr. C. Owen Lovejoy, distinguished University Professor. An internationally recognized biological anthropologist who specializes in the study of human origins, Lovejoy is one of the primary authors who revealed their research findings on Ardipithecus ramidus, a hominid species that lived 4.4 million years ago.
